Notes: Until 2014, the Independent Evaluation Department (IED) has been reporting success rates based on a combination of success rates of self-evaluated project completion reports (PCRs), IED-validated PCRs, and independent evaluations (project performance evaluation reports [PPERs]). Starting 2015, two changes have been implemented in reporting the success rates of Asian Development Bank operations: (i) the ratings are based only on the validated PCRs and PPERs and do not include the ratings from unvalidated self-evaluations, and (ii) the ratings are reported not by calendar year but for the year ending in June (e.g., 2017 success rates are derived from success rates of validated PCRs and PPERs completed from July 2016 to June 2017).
